MCG Health (doing business as Georgia Regents Medical Center)

Marjorie Shaw Phillips, M.S. R.Ph., FASHP (PGY1 Residency Program Director)*,**

Marjorie Shaw Phillips, M.S., FASHP, is Pharmacy Manager (Clinical Research and Education), Georgia Regents Medical Center and Clinical Professor, University of Georgia College of Pharmacy. A member of the Pharmacy Leadership Team, her practice includes clinical research pharmacy and coordination of technician students and observers for the pharmacy department. After serving as the Pharmacy Residency Coordinator for nine years, Marjorie became the PGY1 Program Director in 2008. She also precepts a Pharm.D. rotation in Clinical Research/Investigational Drug Services (APPE). From 1995 to 2010, she served as the Chair of the health system Medication Error Prevention Committee (MEPC) and she continues to be actively involved as a member of MEPC. The MEPC is an interdisciplinary group whose focus is review of local/national medication error reports and hospital efforts to improve medication safety and increase event reporting in a non-punitive environment. She has been a member of the Georgia Regents University Institutional Review Board (IRB) for 23 years, and after 13 years as a Vice-Chair became Chair of GRU IRB-C in January 2015. She is a member of the Georgia Regents University Cancer Center and serves on the Protocol Review and Monitoring (Scientific Review) Committee for the Cancer Center.

Marjorie received her M.S. in Hospital Pharmacy from the University of Florida College of Pharmacy and completed a two-year hospital pharmacy residency at Shands Hospital at the University of Florida in 1984. The next six years were spent practicing hospital pharmacy, with an emphasis in quality and performance improvement, at two Florida hospitals (Shands-UF/Gainesville and Memorial Hospital-Ormond Beach). In 1990, she joined the pharmacy staff at the Medical College of Georgia (MCG) Hospitals and Clinics (the organization that later became MCG Health and Georgia Regents).

ASHP service includes Chair of the House of Delegates (2003-2006), Board of Directors (2002-2006), House of Delegates, Council on Organizational Affairs (1991-1994), Ad Hoc Committee on Policy Development, USP Advisory Committee, Section of Clinical Specialists Communication and Education Committees and drafter for two ASHP Guidelines. She is Past President, Georgia Society of Health-System Pharmacists and Eastern Shores Florida Society of Hospital Pharmacists, and a past Board Member and Committee Chair for both FSHP and GSHP. In 1997, she was GSHP Pharmacist of the Year. She served on the Steering Committee for the Southeastern Residency Conference from 2000 to 2011 and completed a five-year term as Treasurer in 2005.

Her professional contributions also include over 40 publications and 70 presentations (on varying topics including medication safety, performance improvement, team-building, and clinical trials compliance) and several book chapters (quality improvement, medication safety). She served two five-year terms on the USP Safe Medication Use Expert Committee (2005-2010), as Vice-chair for the second term, and continues as an Expert Consultant for USP. Marjorie was recognized by the UGA College of Pharmacy with its Distinguished Service Award at Homecoming 2011 and was appointed to the FDA Drug Safety and Risk Management Advisory Committee in fall 2012.

Christy M. Norman, M.S., Pharm.D., BCPS (Administrative Director of Pharmacy, Director of Pharmacy Residency Programs)**

Christy Norman became the Administrative Director of Pharmacy for Georgia Regents Medical Center in February 2014 after previously serving as Pharmacy Manager for Clinical Services. Christy also holds an appointment as Clinical Assistant Professor at the University of Georgia, College of Pharmacy. She obtained her Doctor of Pharmacy from the University of Georgia, Athens, GA and her M.S. in Health System Pharmacy Administration from The Ohio State University. She completed a 24-month Specialty Practice Residency in Health-System Pharmacy Administration at The Ohio State University Medical Center. Christy was awarded the Tim Moore Award from The Ohio State University, College of Pharmacy, for outstanding performance in the Masters in Health-System Pharmacy Administration program. Christy joined the Georgia Regents Health System team in July 2008. From 2008-2010, Christy was responsible for inpatient adult central and clinical operations, supervision of clinical pharmacists and pharmacy technicians, controlled substances management, and manufacturing and packaging. From 2010 until fall 2014, she has been responsible for the management of clinical services, serves as the coordinator for Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committees, chairs the Medication Error Prevention Committee, and coordinates the Department of Pharmacy's performance improvement initiatives. In her manager role she had been providing a Drug Information and Administration experience for pharmacy students and Drug Policy/Administration experience for PGY1 and PGY2 pharmacy residents. She continues to serve as the preceptor for Pharmacy Administration/Pharmacy Management.

Christy is an active member of the Georgia Society of Health System Pharmacists (GSHP), serving on the Education Committee and now as a District Director for the Central Savannah River area. The pharmacy newsletter she and Dianne May produced for Georgia Regents Medical Center was recognized by GSHP as the outstanding health-system pharmacy newsletter in Georgia (October 2012). She is co-author of a chapter on Pharmacy Operations in the first and second editions of the textbook Pharmacy Management, Leadership, Marketing and Finance on Pharmacy Operations (covering workflow, practice activities, medication safety and technology). Christy is also an active member of ASHP, ACCP, the University Health-system Consortium (UHC) Supply Chain Committee, and the Novation Pharmacy Distribution & Analytics Advisory Group. She has been a frequent speaker at GSHP statewide educational meetings, with topics including the Pharmacy Practice Model Initiative, drug shortages, and management of alcohol withdrawal.

Samm Anderegg, Pharm.D., MS, BCPS is the Pharmacy Manager of Ambulatory Care and Oncology Services at Georgia Regents Medical Center in Augusta, Georgia and Clinical Assistant Professor at the University of Georgia College of Pharmacy.

As a pharmacy administrator at Georgia Regents, Dr. Anderegg is responsible for oncology and ambulatory care operations, clinical services, revenue cycle management, co-manages specialty pharmacy services, and serves as secretary of the Oncology Pharmacy and Therapeutics Subcommittee. In his academic role, he lectures, participates in research, and precepts residents and students. Samm has been active in several professional pharmacy associations including the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists and Georgia Society of Health-System Pharmacists. He is also involved in national initiatives concerning health information technology. Dr. Anderegg serves as the chair of the Value Set Committee and is a member of the Professional Service Documentation and Coding Workgroup within the Pharmacy HIT Collaborative. The Collaborative is a coalition of pharmacy associations and their members working to ensure pharmacists' role of providing direct patient care is integrated into the national HIT interoperable framework. In addition, Dr. Anderegg is co-creator of the mobile app, PACT (Pharmacy Ambulatory Care Intervention Tracker), designed for ambulatory care pharmacy documentation and intervention analytics.

Samm grew up in Charles City, Iowa and graduated with distinction from the University of Iowa College of Pharmacy. Dr. Anderegg completed his post-graduate residency training in a Health-System Pharmacy Administration program (PGY1/PGY2) combined with a Masters in Health-System Pharmacy at the University of Kansas.

Tana Bagby, Pharm.D. (Informatics Pharmacist)

Tana is a graduate of the University of Georgia College of Pharmacy (1996) and the MCG Pharmacy Practice Residency Program (1997). Her first post-residency position was one that she helped justify, as the first Pharmacy Clinical Specialist in the MCG Renal Transplant Clinic as part of a Mason Trust Grant. The results of this demonstration grant (initially published in AJHP in 1998 and 2000) were the first to show the benefit of pharmaceutical care services for this ambulatory patient population. Tana was also the Research Scientist for the Medical College of Georgia Center for Clinical Investigation in 1999-2000. Other experiences included pharmacy practice at Georgia Correctional Health Care (Augusta State Medical Prison) and Dwight D. Eisenhower Army Medical Center before returning to MCG Health (now Georgia Regents Medical Center) in July 2007. Since summer 2015 she has been a member of the pharmacy informatics team, a new role, and is already proving to be a key resource for optimizing the electronic medical record system for computerized order entry, verification, pharmacy care monitoring and safer medication use.

Jacquelyn Bryant, Pharm.D., BCPS (Critical Care Pharmacy Specialist, MICU)

Jackie is a graduate of the South Carolina College of Pharmacy (University of South Carolina, Columbia). After completing her PGY1 Pharmacy and PGY2 Critical Care Pharmacy residencies at Georgia Regents Medical Center and University of Georgia

College of Pharmacy, Jackie stayed on as a member of the Georgia Regents Critical Care team with a focus in the Medicine ICU. Jackie has been an active member of the Pharmacy Performance Improvement (PI) Team since her residency, served on the Medication Error Prevention Committee for 2 years, and has also been a member of the Intensive Care Unit Committee. Results of her research comparing mannitol and 23.4% hypertonic saline for the management of elevated intracranial pressure following brain injury were presented locally and nationally in 2014 (43rd Society of Critical Care Medicine Annual Congress, Georgia Area Critical Care Pharmacist Network Annual Meeting, GRMC Stroke Center Conference). She is co-author of a textbook chapter on how to prepare an effective journal club in The Clinical Practice of Drug Information and coauthor on a review of raltegravir in *Annals of Pharmacotherapy* (April 2012). She is an active member of the Society of Critical Care Medicine (SCCM), ASHP, ACCP, and GSHP, a preceptor for University of Georgia College of Pharmacy and served as a graduate teaching assistant for UGA in 2012-2014.

Richard Burrell, B.S. Pharmacy, MBA (Pharmacy Manager of Information Systems and Finance)

Richard received his B.S. degree in Pharmacy from the University of South Carolina in 1987. He completed his Masters in Business Administration also from the University of South Carolina in 1989. He then completed an ASHP Hospital Pharmacy residency with an emphasis in Pharmacy Administration from 1989-90 at the Medical College of Georgia (now doing business as Georgia Regents). He was hired as a frontline pharmacist at MCG in 1990 and became Operations Supervisor in 1993. In 1995, he moved into the position of Assistant Director in charge of financial operations. Currently serving as Pharmacy Manager and a member of the Pharmacy Leadership Team, Richard's main focus is pharmacy informatics and automation with particular emphasis on Computerized Prescriber Order Entry (CPOE) development. Additionally, he serves as the manager in charge of pharmacy revenue, Adult and Children's Operating Room Pharmacies and narcotic management. He precepts pharmacy students in the area of hospital information systems and is a great resource for the residents on hospital analytic data and technology.

Micaela Carroll, Pharm.D (Internal Medicine Pharmacy Specialist)*

Micaela joined the Georgia Regents Medical Center Pharmacy team in the summer of 2014 as an internal medicine pharmacist. She received her Pharm.D. from Northeastern University in Boston, MA and went on to complete a PGY1 Pharmacy Residency at Broward Health Medical Center in Fort Lauderdale, FL. During her PGY2 Residency in Internal Medicine at West Virginia University Healthcare in Morgantown, WV, she served as an APPE preceptor for Internal Medicine. Micaela's areas of interest include anticoagulation, pulmonary diseases, and precepting. Kevin received his B.S. in Pharmacy from Wayne State University in 1986 and has worked in a variety of institutional pharmacy practice settings, including as a night pharmacist in Evanston Hospital (Illinois), and within MCG Health as the Ambulatory Care Pharmacy Supervisor (10 years), OR Pharmacy Supervisor (2 years), lead pharmacist in the Main Pharmacy operations area and Pharmacy Operations Manager (2010-2015) before returning to the consultant pharmacist for our nursing home in spring 2015, a position he also held from 2006 to 2010. Georgia War Veteran's Nursing Home is a State of Georgia long-term care facility managed by the university that is accredited by both the VA and The Joint Commission. We have been recognized during our last 2 Joint Commission accreditation surveys for exemplary pharmacy services and the value of pharmacist chart notes. Kevin has served as both the President and Vice President of the Augusta Area Pharmaceutical Association, and taught a patient Diabetes Education class at the MCG Senior Health Center for two years. He is a member of the Georgia Society of Health System Pharmacists. He is a Preceptor for a popular University of Georgia College of Pharmacy geriatrics Advanced Pharmacy Practice Experience (APPE) for Pharm.D. students at the nursing home. Kevin also interacts with the residents during their weekend staffing.

Maggie Cravens, Pharm.D. (Pediatric Pharmacist, Ambulatory Care-focus)

Maggie completed her undergraduate studies at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama and went on to receive her Pharm.D. from the McWhorter School of Pharmacy (MSOP) in 2013. After graduation, she completed an ASHP-accredited PGY1 Pharmacy Residency at Children's of Alabama, also in Birmingham. During her residency, she received a teaching certificate and is recognized by Samford University as an affiliate Clinical Instructor of Pharmacy Practice. She is excited to now bring her skills and experience to Georgia Regents. She joined the pharmacy team at GRU Medical Center in August of 2015 with a focus in pediatric ambulatory care. Her prior experience in independent retail pharmacies has given her an enthusiasm for the importance of patient education and continuity of care. To date, Maggie's scholarly interests include pediatric medication safety and pedagogics. Her PGY1 research project on the impact high fidelity simulation experiences may have on learning has recently been submitted for publication. Maggie is a member of ASHP and the Pediatric Pharmacy Advocacy Group (PPAG).

Monica Cromer Magoulas, Pharm.D. (Oncology Pharmacist – Ambulatory Care)

Monica received her Pharm.D. from the University of South Carolina College of Pharmacy in 2009 then worked as a unit based oncology pharmacist from 2009-2012 at University Hospital in Augusta. During this time, she also subspecialized in Neuro ICU, Cardiovascular and end stage renal failure. In 2012, her career path transitioned from inpatient to outpatient oncology when she began working for Medical Oncology Associates (an ambulatory practice owned by University Hospital) as the pharmacist in charge. Dr. Magoulas held this position until 2014 when she joined the Georgia Regents Medical Center pharmacy team as one of the oncology pharmacist in the GRU Cancer

Center. Shortly after starting with GRU, Monica began teaching a weekly class to new patients receiving chemotherapy and their families. She is a preceptor for the University of Georgia College of Pharmacy (Ambulatory Oncology APPE) and began precepting pharmacy residents as a preceptor-in-training in 2015.

Christina E. DeRemer, Pharm.D., BCPS, (Primary Care Pharmacy Specialist, Pharmacy Medicine Team Clinical Supervisor)

She has been recognized as the 2007-2008 and 2012-2013 **Preceptor of the Year** from the UGA, College of Pharmacy and with the 2009 and 2015 **Outstanding Pharmacy Practitioner Award** from the Georgia Society of Health-System Pharmacists (GSHP). In 2011, her efforts and contributions with the anticoagulation clinic were acknowledged in a highlight article featuring the clinic in MCG Health News of Excellence and she was a recipient of the 2011 MCG Health Team Work Award given to the anticoagulation clinic. She is an active member of ACCP, ASHP, and GSHP (where she is also Education Committee Co-Chair). Christina has published on practice innovations, adverse effects of medications, and case reports in the American Journal of Pharmaceutical Education, Journal of Clinical Psychopharmacology, American Journal of Health-System Pharmacy, Pharmacotherapy, the Southern Medical Journal and The American Journal of Medicine, and is dedicated to contributing to the literature. She is a regular presenter at GSHP statewide conferences, and has been an invited speaker at the ASHP Midyear Clinical Meeting. Dr. DeRemer was a Guest Lecturer and presented a conference on pharmacist-managed anticoagulation services via distance learning to Hamad Medical Corporation in Doha, Qatar (main site Al-Wakra Hospital) in July 2013. She also was a presenter at the American Society of Health-system Pharmacists National Pharmacy Preceptor Conference in Washington, D.C. in August 2013. Professional interests include anticoagulation, resident training, and improved pharmacy involvement with hospitalized and clinic patients during transitions in care.

Tom Flynt, Pharm.D. (Psychiatric Pharmacy Specialist)

In 2000 he became an Adult Unit Based Pharmacist Specialist where he provided clinical and distributive services to 2 medicine-nursing units and 1 psychiatric unit. In 2011 he expanded his coverage area to include 2 surgery units.

Tom has served as Adjunct Assistant Professor of Pharmacy at UGA since 1992 and precepts the Georgia Regents Psychiatric APPE Rotation for pharmacy students. He also precepts pharmacy residents on an elective psychiatry acute care experience. Additionally he has been an Assistant Clinical Professor to the Department of Psychiatry at the Medical College of Georgia School of Medicine since 1989. He also completed a 24-month Pharmacy Practice Residency with an emphasis in Health System Pharmacy Administration at The Ohio State University Medical Center. Tad's pharmacy experience includes serving as Pharmacy Manager at St. Joseph's Hospital in Tampa, Florida and Director of Inpatient Pharmacy Services at Harris County Hospital District in Houston, Texas, and Director of Pharmacy at Georgia Regents Medical Center from

He has also served on the Executive Committee of the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists Section of Clinical Specialists and as a member of the ASHP Commission on Credentialing. He is a Past Chair and current member of the Drug Utilization Review Board for the Georgia Department of Community Health.

Gene McGinty, R.Ph. (Renal Transplant Clinical Pharmacist)

Gene McGinty is a graduate of the University of Georgia College of Pharmacy and a pharmacy residency in Rochester, Minnesota who took early retirement after 25 years of service at the Medical College of Georgia Hospital Department of Pharmacy. He now serves Renal Transplant patients as a University of Georgia clinical pharmacist in a Medical College of Georgia clinic. This practice site was the site of a demonstration grant that was the first nationally to show the value of ongoing direct pharmacist involvement in reducing medication-related problems and improving patient outcomes in a Renal Transplant Clinic.
